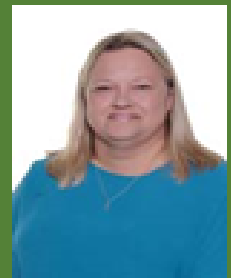

Spotlight on: Understanding the Risks of Exploitation

What is Child Exploitation?

Child exploitation occurs when a child is manipulated, coerced, or deceived into situations where they are taken advantage of. This can happen online or in person and may involve receiving something (such as gifts, money, or attention) in exchange for doing something they may not fully understand or feel comfortable with.

Types of Exploitation

- Criminal exploitation – where children may be pressured into illegal activities, such as carrying items or money.
- Sexual exploitation – where a child may be groomed into inappropriate or harmful situations.
- Online exploitation – where children are targeted through games, social media, or messaging apps.

Signs to Look Out For

- Every child is different, but some possible warning signs include:
- Sudden changes in behaviour, mood, or friendships
- Becoming secretive about online activity or phone use
- Receiving gifts or money without explanation
- Spending more time away from home or going missing
- Changes in school attendance or engagement
- How You Can Help at Home
- Talk openly and regularly with your child about their day and who they spend time with
- Encourage them to speak up if something makes them feel uncomfortable
- Know what apps, games, and websites they are using
- Set clear boundaries around internet use and privacy
- Reassure your child that they can always come to you for help without fear of punishment

What do I do if.....

We are often asked what to do if someone suspects a child is at risk of harm.

If the child attends our setting then please come and speak with one of the safeguarding team where we can advise and signpost you accordingly.

If the child is not in our setting or speaking to us is not an option EG. School closed/ danger is imminent then follow the following pathways.

If a child is in imminent danger call 999

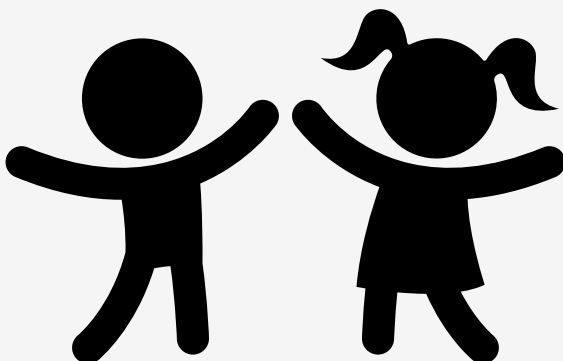
